

## Kendall County Historical Commission Unveiling Pinta Trail Marker



The Pinta Trail (in Kendall County) has been awarded a marker by the Texas Historical Commission (THC). The Pinta Trail was one of two Kendall County Native-American pathways that channeled the indigenous, as well as explorers, rangers, soldiers, settlers and emigrants through our Kendall County lands into the unknown, the west and ultimately settlement. It was the IH 10 of its day. Please join Kendall County Historical Commission (KCHC) in a commemoration of this unique

trail on Saturday, April 5<sup>th</sup> @ 10:00 and learn about the historical significance of Camino Pinta, as well as the Ammann/Sultenfuss Ranch and its earliest owner, George Wilkins Kendall. Free and open to the public, the hosting address is 216 Ammann Rd\*. The THC marker unveiling will take place @ 10:15 sharp, so plan to arrive early. Please enter the front gate and park along the ranch road.



\*216 Ammann Road is approximately 5 miles east of Boerne's intersection of River Road and Main Street (from Boerne, first travel along River Road/State Highway 46 and then along Ammann Road).
